

The Power of Collaboration

Study at RCS and you'll work with fellow students as part of a community where learning and creativity go hand in hand under one roof. Our production of the musical *Children of Eden* is a perfect example.

From sound to scenic art, from carpentry to costume, and from props to performance, the staging of this epic and expansive musical brought together almost 100 students from across RCS.

They designed and constructed the elaborate moving set, performed music, hand-stitched the costumes, devised ambitious automation and lighting plans, generated an immersive sound world and ensured that every element, on stage and off, was seamlessly managed for the duration of the run.

The show perfectly illustrates what it means to study at RCS, a place where all the performing arts are taught under one roof in an environment that cultivates a culture of creative collaboration... where artists come together across art forms to make magic happen.

Children of Eden, in RCS's New Athenaeum Theatre, was the final public performance for the BA Musical Theatre class of 2023, who shared the spotlight with students from the School of Music, and from MA Musical Theatre: Musical Directing, BA Production Arts and Design and BA Production Technology and Management.

The musical, about the timeless conflict between parents and children, and written by the creator of *Wicked* and *Godspell*, takes its inspiration from the Book of Genesis, and traces humanity's fall, from Adam and Eve to the story of Noah.

"It's been absolutely amazing," said Star Penders, BA Musical Theatre student, who played the role of Father. "In third year, we perform big shows where we're constantly working with other people like sound, music, production, set designers... it's great to get to work with loads of other students from different departments and see the work that they put into things. It's such an ensemble show, so everybody feels like a proper community."

Fellow musical theatre student Michali Dantes agreed: "It feels like such a huge student effort across the whole production, and it makes it really special."

As the only conservatoire in Europe to offer degrees across all of the performing arts, the curriculum is built around collaboration in performance. And more than 500 public performances every year make RCS one of Scotland's busiest arts venues.

Many of our drama productions are jointly created with students from our Production degree programmes. Production students help to bring the director's vision to life; whether it's designing the set and costumes, taking control of the sound and lighting design or stage-managing the crew and performances.

"Theatre is all about collaboration between different people – it wouldn't happen if you didn't have that," said Sophie Sholl, the show's set and costume designer who studied on the BA Production Arts and Design programme.

"We're encouraged to collaborate, be self-motivated and look outside the box," added Eoin Beaton, a BA Production Technology and Management student who was *Children of Eden*'s lighting technician and followspot operator. "I've enjoyed this show being student-led; all the heads of departments are third years. In some other shows, external people will come in, but this feels like a nice way to round off the end of the year."

Scotty Scott, Head of Flys on the show, enjoyed the autonomy of *Children of Eden* and having the run of RCS's 344-seat New Athenaeum Theatre: "We get a whole theatre to ourselves, we get to play, we get to make everything move on the stage and be a part of it, either creating the system for it or putting these massive sets in and rolling them about the stage. And all of it is us.

"Getting to decide what things look like is really exciting for us – we've been able to take it into our own hands."

Children of Eden was brought to the RCS stage using the Theatre Green Book, an environmentally conscious framework to make the theatre industry more sustainable and which puts future theatre-makers at the heart of the climate conversation.

The Theatre Green Book is a free resource for everyone in the UK theatre sector and sets standards for making productions sustainably, for making theatre buildings sustainable, and for improving operations like catering and front of house.

Ros Maddison, Head of Production, and Lynfryn MacKenzie, Head of Technical Production, are working with students and staff to ensure processes and outputs, over multiple disciplines and art forms, are as sustainable as possible. Their work has led to RCS becoming one of the first drama schools to have environmental sustainability embedded into final-year learning outcomes for production students.

It includes making sure materials come from reused or recycled sources and that they can go on to future lives, avoiding harmful and unsustainable materials, running technical systems efficiently and reducing journeys and deliveries

On Stage at Celtic Connections

Every year, students from RCS's Traditional Music programmes – one of a few UK Bachelor of Music degrees dedicated to traditional and folk music – perform at this world-famous festival in Glasgow, that attracts fans from around the globe.

And in 2024, classical musicians from RCS also joined the Celtic Connections lineup for two special and sold-out performances at legendary Glasgow venues.

First up on that Saturday afternoon in January, students from across the BMus and MA/MMus Traditional Music programmes played a storming set at Glasgow's Royal Concert Hall.

The Big Folk Band showcase of new music was written and arranged for the festival, and directed by RCS Creative Producer and award-winning guitarist Jenn Butterworth.

"The annual Celtic gig is a unique element of the Traditional Music programmes and one of the highlights of the year. Professional opportunities of this scale are invaluable for students, from the experience of playing in a venue like the Royal Concert Hall to the industry connections they make."

Later that night, the RCS Symphony Orchestra, conducted by John Logan, Head of Brass and Head of Timpani & Percussion, raised the roof of Glasgow's iconic Barrowland Ballroom in *Roddy Hart's Roaming Roots Revue*, an epic concert that brought together a host of Scottish bands and musicians, including Biffy Clyro's Simon Neil, Del Amitri's Justin Currie, Eddi Reader and Brownbear.

The concert was replicated the following night at the Concert Hall. "It was RCS's first-ever Barrowlands gig and it was incredible to perform at such a legendary venue that has played host to some of the biggest names in music," said John Logan.

"A symphony orchestra onstage at the Barrowlands, performing a fresh spin on modern Scottish classics, was something pretty special. It was an amazing experience for students, who shared the stage with some of the UK's top artists."

On Tour with Scottish Ballet

The curtain rises and a hush settles over the audience at Edinburgh's Festival Theatre. Outside may be a cold and grey January day but in here, magic is about to happen. The orchestra strikes up, a dazzling Art Nouveau-inspired set appears, and the stage floods with the dancers of Scottish Ballet, a whirl of shimmering, billowing ballgowns and colourful costumes, as they bring a fresh spin on a muchloved favourite to the stage.

Amongst them are five students from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland's Modern Ballet degree programme, who have joined the company for its winter season, which will see them tour *Cinders!* in theatres across Scotland and the north of England.

The BA Modern Ballet programme at RCS is delivered in partnership with Scottish Ballet, where students work with the artistic team, dancers, and acclaimed teachers and choreographers, including Artistic Director and CEO Christopher Hampson, throughout their studies. Final-year students take company class with Scottish Ballet at their HQ at Tramway, and every year, some are selected to join the company on tour.

Third years, Tahlia Buckley, Mia Nicholas, Mary-Jean Riley, Phoebe Watson and Elizabeth Williams, are on the second leg of *Cinders!* in Edinburgh, after its premiere in Glasgow. From the capital, they'll venture to Aberdeen, Inverness and Newcastle, in a run that takes in 61 shows.

Going on the road with a world-renowned company, while still a student, is rare, says Kerry Livingstone, Head of the Modern Ballet degree programme at RCS.

"It's an incredible opportunity to perform with a company like Scottish Ballet before graduating and embarking on a mainstage tour across the country and further afield.

"It's one of the unique elements of our partnership with Scottish Ballet – students working alongside and learning from some of the best in the industry.

"They're immersed in the day-to-day life of a professional dancer which gives them the insight, experience and skills to prepare for a career in dance."

After the curtain falls on the matinee, the RCS dancers have a couple of hours before they're back on stage for the evening performance. The tour, they all agree, has been a phenomenal learning experience.

Mia Nicholas, from Scotland, who was part of Scottish Ballet's Associate programme before joining RCS, describes it as 'incredible and inspiring'.

"Getting to work with the company that I've grown up with and learn from the professional dancers who I've watched since I was little is amazing – it has been a dream!

"It has helped me learn more about myself as a dancer and how to work independently. Also, a few weeks ago, I was put on stage with only an hour's notice, so I got to experience that high-pressure environment, which really sets you up for what you're training to do and the career that comes with it."

And she says she doesn't want her time at RCS to come to an end: "The friendships I've made will last a lifetime and it's such a positive environment. I'm just so grateful for all my teachers and the help that I've been given to get me to this point and the opportunity to perform in *Cinders!...* I'm just so grateful."

Elizabeth Williams, from Sydney, says being in a professional environment shows emerging dancers what's expected in the industry: "It's different to school in the sense that you're more in charge of your own schedule so it shows you how to approach your training every day. Independence is a big thing that I'll take away from this experience."

Elizabeth says it is an 'amazing' opportunity for emerging dancers: "Even taking company class every day is a dream come true. It's really something to be part of such a big production like this and it's bridging the gap between being a student and being a professional and seeing what it is that you're striving for."

"Being on stage with so many incredible artists, the buzz while performing and dancing in front of a live audience has been magical," adds Mary-Jean Riley, from Brighton.

"Being able to take class and dance alongside people who have done this for so long, and are so experienced, and getting to see how they approach everything has really helped me get an idea of what it's like in company life, and they've been extremely kind and welcoming.

"It's important to experience what you're training for, and it gives you confidence and helps shape you into your own individual dancer."



The tour has further cemented New Zealand student Phoebe Watson's passion for ballet: "I'm just really inspired. It has made me realise why I'm doing this and how much I love it.

"Even the rehearsal process and classes at Scottish Ballet were inspiring for me, watching the other dancers and how they approach this job," Phoebe continued.

"I've really enjoyed touring and it has been cool going to different cities. One of the main factors of studying at RCS was the connection with Scottish Ballet, as well as how broad the curriculum is. It's a really nurturing environment." As pointe shoes are untied and costumes hung up between shows, Tahlia Buckley, from Australia, smiles as she says it has been 'surreal'.

"Today's actually our 38th performance - it has been an amazing experience and I've really enjoyed working with the company.

"I feel very fortunate for how it is shaping me as an artist, being immersed in the company and seeing how everything comes together.

"As a student, our end goal is to be a working dancer and having these opportunities really helps us understand what it takes to be at that professional level."

Professional performance venues

RCS is one of Scotland's busiest performing arts venues. Each year we programme over 500 performances across our five venues.

The New Athenaeum Theatre

Known to staff and students as 'The Ath', this is RCS's main performance theatre seating almost 350 people. Here you'll find musical theatre, ballet, acting and opera showcasing their largest productions of the year, expertly managed by production students working with industry-standard lighting and sound equipment as well as our Stage Technologies flying system. The Ath also holds an orchestra pit which provides fantastic opportunities for music students to play as part of a large-scale production's musical accompaniment.

Stevenson Hall

The Stevenson Hall, also known as 'The Stevie', is our main concert performance venue, equipped with a full lighting rig and high specification sound system. Performances in the Stevenson Hall have included the RCS Symphony Orchestra playing Shostakovich's Fourth Symphony, Mahler's Sixth and Seventh symphonies and Richard Strauss' Ein Heldenleben.

Alexander Gibson Opera School (AGOS)

The AGOS is used by our school of opera for rehearsals and development workshops. It's the space where, in the past, we developed our multi-award-winning premiere of the original version of War and Peace, which was presented in partnership with Scottish Opera before embarking on tour.

Ledger Recital Room

The Ledger Recital Room features a striking, open design with sycamore panelling and a minstrels' gallery. The Ledger seats over 100 people and is the venue for many of our workshops and masterclasses.

The Chandler Studio Theatre

The Chandler is a versatile studio theatre, seating up to 125 in various configurations. It's a black box studio which is used by most performance programmes. As well as staging plays, and hosting our annual production arts and design showcase, the Chandler is frequently used for devised performances and technical teaching sessions.

Rehearsal and practice rooms

With more than 90 practice and rehearsal spaces across our two buildings, students can make the most of their learning experience at RCS. You'll also find a suite of studios, built to accommodate large-scale sets for a true rehearsal experience. Some practice rooms are equipped with a sound system, piano, television and lighting bars. Others are acoustically separated for individual practice and one-to-one teaching lessons.

Home to Production Arts

The Production facilities at RCS have been custom-built to ensure you have the best possible learning experience. Wallace Studios at Speirs Locks is home to RCS's design studios, paintshop, proprooms, wardrobe and construction workshops. Everything you need to dream, design and create work for performance is right here. At the heart of Wallace Studios is the massive construction workshop with fully equipped welding bay and machine shop. The adjoining paintshop is extensive and large enough to house a full-sized paint frame, the only one of its kind in Scotland.

Design Studios

This is where the creative process starts. The design studios have been specially created to be light, airy spaces where designers can work on their creative concepts, producing the appropriate drawings and model boxes to communicate their visions to the students who will make them. These studios are havens of creativity and design students have free access to these spaces to work independently whenever the building is open.

Production Arts Workshops

At the heart of Wallace Studios is the massive construction workshop with fully equipped welding bay and machine shop. The adjoining paintshop is also extensive and large enough to house a full-sized paint frame, the only one of its kind in Scotland. There are three well-equipped props workshops facilitating both wet and dry prop making activities as well as providing individual spaces for personal projects and portfolio work. Almost all RCS sets and props are created within these workshops and production students will work alongside the designers and directors to create the best theatre experience possible.

Wardrobe

Get lost in wardrobe, with costumes and accessories from every era imaginable. Here, you'll also find purpose-built costume construction workshops and stores equipped with industrial and domestic sewing machines, Stockman dummies and a comprehensive costume reference library.

Ballet studios

Train with the professionals in our purpose-built ballet studios. Modern Ballet students benefit from a suite of studios and a fitness room, complete with Gyrotonics® equipment. Students can access physiotherapy sessions, pilates and massage. All four of the dance studios come with a piano, a playback system and have access to dressing rooms and showers with fully accessible toilets.

Where Did You Go From Here?

Whether it's the stage of the Royal Shakespeare Company before you've even graduated, or leaping into a dream role at a world-renowned ballet company, where do our graduates go after leaving RCS?

We caught up with some RCS alumni who share their post-graduation paths and how their studies have shaped their careers.

Hannah Cubitt

BA Modern Ballet, 2019 Artist, Scottish Ballet

What were your first jobs after graduating?

In third year at RCS, I joined as one of the artists for the *Cinderella* tour and danced with them for three months or so. At the end of the tour, I was offered a job. It didn't feel real! I'd watched Scottish Ballet growing up and I never actually thought that it could be me on stage with them one day.

How did RCS prepare you for the industry?

It prepared me so much. RCS has such a professional atmosphere and it's inspiring because you're in such a motivated environment and everyone wants the best outcome for everyone. I feel like RCS has a uniqueness – you don't just work within the ballet department, you work with every department, which I find so interesting. Every year, we got to work alongside stage management, the technicians, the set and costume designers. A big part of RCS also was how you could become your own individual artist and not fall into the robotic, 'what you're meant to follow' system. It's 'how do you want to be perceived as a dancer?' RCS pushes boundaries.

What did you enjoy most about your studies?

The course is quite small, so you have personal relationships with all the staff – they're not just your lecturers, they're more like your support system and guides and leaders. They're always there for you. My third year was quite special. It started off touring with Scottish Ballet and then getting a job at the end of it. The relationships I've built with my year, especially, are so powerful and beautiful, and we have such support for one another. And we had fun in third year! One of my favourite experiences is when we performed at Buckingham Palace. It was such a surreal moment.



Does anything stand out from your training that you've carried into your professional life?

RCS training supported us to become unique and individual artists. They helped me shape how I want to be perceived as a dancer and I was given the freedom to develop my own personal style, avoiding the self-limiting temptation to 'blend in' and conform to conventions.

Any career highlights?

Being at Scottish Ballet feels like home, I have such wonderful feelings towards the company. I have lots of favourite moments from my time here. One was when I got to perform Mazelda in *The Snow Queen* and I played Morag in *Cinders!*, which involved character work and I'd come off stage in hysterics. And then there's *Swan Lake*. It's such a challenging piece and to do Big Swans on top of it is so rewarding and fulfilling.

What would you say to those thinking about studying at RCS?

The Royal Conservatoire of Scotland

Even if it's just auditioning for the experience, it's so worthwhile. And you really can't explain the environment of RCS unless you've been in there. It's such a different world and the motto, 'Like Nowhere Else' – I truly believe that. I've never experienced an environment the same as it, it's so special.

Benjamin Osugo

BA Acting, 2023 Actor

What were your first jobs after graduating?

I was cast in *Macbeth* at the Royal Shakespeare Company before I graduated, so I missed the graduation ceremony as I went straight into an eight-week rehearsal period in London. I had to try and forget how big a company I was going into and focus on the job! It was a great learning experience. I had one of the smaller roles, Angus, which had a good number of lines but a lot of the time, I was observing how the other actors worked and letting that sink in. I learnt a lot from watching them. I try to see everything I do as a learning experience. After London, we went to Stratford and then I came back to Scotland to do *A Christmas Carol* with Dundee Rep.

Any career highlights?

Everything! It has been just under a year since graduating. Working with fellow RCS graduates, Anna Russell-Martin and Shyvonne Ahmmad in *Macbeth* was special.

How did RCS prepare you for the industry?

I've taken so much away from my studies. It was a fantastic foundation for me. The emphasis on your development as an artist, not just an actor, but someone who has a voice, and something to say. That's the kind of the thing when you step out into the world that makes you invincible.

What did you enjoy most about your studies?

Working with external directors made an impact on me – people who are not just there to teach but are role models. This taught me about the word professionalism, not in the sense of you go to an office and wear a suit or being formal. It's defining that for yourself. For me, it's doing what you need to do to be the best performer you can.

Does anything stand out from your training that you've carried into your professional life?

What I come back to are the classes in first year, where you're playing around and getting to know each other... they're disguised as games but they're really about how to connect with people and getting to know each other.

What would you say to those thinking about studying at RCS?

Be yourself – be authentic. When you audition and are accepted, remember that the panel have seen something in you, and you owe it to yourself to see that same thing – the magic that you have.

What were your first jobs after graduating?

After graduating in July 2021, I went on to study at the Royal College of Music until July 2023, which is when I started my job as Principal Clarinet No. 2 at the BBC SSO. I've since moved onto the BBC Symphony Orchestra in London as Co-Principal Clarinet.

Any career highlights?

I've been very fortunate to have so many incredible experiences. Some that immediately jump to mind are a memorised performance of Shostakovich's 9th Symphony with Aurora Orchestra, Sir James MacMillan's clarinet concerto *Ninian* at the RCM and an electric Tchaikovsky's 6th Symphony with the BBC SSO and Ilan Volkov at the 2023 Proms.

How did RCS prepare you for the industry?

The sheer variety, amount, and quality of music that I got to play gave me so many opportunities to develop my skills and push myself outside my comfort zone. Orchestral repertoire classes helped me build a solid foundation in playing in a wind section in an orchestra. I developed and honed my skills in performance classes and orchestral, chamber and contemporary projects. The key takeaway for me was that all my experiences at RCS helped me ensure I could rise to any technical, musical or professional challenge.

What did you enjoy most about your studies?

The highlights were my weekly lessons with my teacher, John Cushing – we covered a huge amount of repertoire in the most inspiring, exciting and encouraging ways. John helped me realise what I wanted to achieve and gave me the tools to go and do exactly that.



Does anything stand out from your training that you've carried into your professional life?

My teacher, John, knew how to push me to achieve my potential but he could also tell when I was pushing myself too much. And so, he helped me learn when you need to take a break. It can be tempting to fill every gap in your day, especially when you've got a lot coming up.

What would you say to those thinking about studying at RCS?

Choosing to study at RCS was one of the greatest decisions I have made, both professionally and personally. When I look back at the course of my career so far, my studies at RCS were a time of exponential growth and personal development. The nurturing environment is such that I was able to rapidly develop as a musician, but also as a person thanks to the supportive staff and students around me. It's a wonderful, inspirational place to learn.

Colleen Bell

BA Filmmaking, 2022 Filmmaker

What were your first jobs after graduating?

I got my first job in TV just before graduation. Trying to write my grad film script while also working as a production runner for Raise the Roof Productions was incredibly difficult! I also really pushed myself, so did some amazing things like shoot a game show in development, edit casting tapes for *Love It or List It*, manage a prop store and help test crafts for *Kirstie's Handmade Christmas*. My experience was invaluable and always stands me in good stead in interviews for upcoming jobs – I get to say I can try my hand at just about anything!

Any career highlights?

Sitting in the audience of Glasgow Film Festival and hearing people laugh at the script I wrote for *Next in Line* (short film by Seyma Dag). It was a sensitive script about the struggles of the benefits system and living as a refugee in Scotland, but I am glad I was able to strike a balance between funny and dramatic.

How did RCS prepare you for the industry?

I honed my creative skills here, which in turn built my confidence, so when I was ready to go out into the world, self-doubt didn't hold me back from taking career risks and pursuing opportunities that I wouldn't have been able to do before RCS.

What did you enjoy most about your studies?

RCS was an excellent environment to just play as an artist, it's a safe environment to try, fail, and try again.

Does anything stand out from your training that you've carried into your professional life?

Set boundaries. A tired artist is no good. And sometimes it's okay to lock your phone away in a drawer and touch some grass.

You do belong here. I never for a million years thought someone like me from a low socio-economic background and estrangement could make it in a conservatoire. The reality is, I have never felt more welcomed and seen in my entire life. RCS will recognise your artistry and welcome you home with open arms.

What were your first jobs after graduating?

My very first job after graduating was singing in the chorus of the Bayreuth Festival in Germany: it was very impressive to be part of such an important institution. Afterwards, I was invited to sing the Prizewinners' recital with Hurn Court Opera. Then I sang the Dew Fairy for Hampstead Garden Opera: it was lovely to explore this character again after having performed it in RCS's production of *Hänsel und Gretel* in 2022.

Any career highlights?

Singing the three coloratura roles in Ravel's *L'enfant et les sortilèges* at Opéra de Monte-Carlo. I was part of their Young Artists Programme this season: it was amazing to sing the Fire, the Princess and the Nightingale with such a company and meet Cecilia Bartoli.

How did RCS prepare you for the industry?

We got to do countless mock auditions for industry professionals so that we're quite used to them by the time we got out in the real world. Also, we took part in many productions which gave us an opportunity to refine our acting and singing skills and learn how to work with professional directors and conductors, very much reproducing work conditions of the industry. I really felt like I got to know myself and how I approached different situations whilst I was at RCS, which gave me confidence and somewhat smoothed my entry into my career.

What did you enjoy most about your studies?

I loved every opportunity I had to perform with the orchestra, not only during the opera productions but also in master-classes and workshops with Scottish Opera and during other projects with the Ballet or the Conducting departments. Otherwise, I loved my teachers, Scott Johnson and Elizabeth McCormack. They were so caring and supportive, while still pushing me to give my best. I felt that they respected the vision I had for my voice and career and helped me develop vocally and achieve my goals.




Does anything stand out from your training that you've carried into your professional life?

On the one hand, a conservatoire is a great place to get to know one's limits and learn how to say no. On the other hand, at the beginning of your career, it can be very hard to get jobs and offers often come last minute, so being able to say yes and learn music quickly, under pressure, is a great skill. Resilience and determination are some of the most important virtues to do this job... and it starts at a conservatoire! All one can do is believe in oneself, not be afraid to try things out and dare to ask for support, then trust that hard work will ultimately pay off.

What would you say to those thinking about studying at RCS?

The facilities at RCS are fabulous, the staff are great and very supportive and there are lots of interesting musical projects to take part in. RCS really offers a positive environment for students and gathers such a nice community! They say people make Glasgow: this is also true for RCS. Glasgow is a great city to live and study. There's all you need there, yet it is not too big a place. I can say that I have been very happy there, it was a great environment to pursue a course as intensive as an opera school can be and I miss it a lot now that I am back in London.

MA/MFA Production (Design/Management) One year/16 months, full-time

The MA/MFA Production (Design/Management) programme is for those seeking to further enhance their skills as stage or production managers, or as lighting, sound, or set and costume designers through an exploration of individual and collaborative practice.

Collaboration is at the centre of our philosophy. Having entered the programme with the core specialist skills required to fulfil the role of a designer or a manager, you will be introduced to other priorities which will inform and enhance your production practice within the context of the ensemble as part of a cohort of emerging artists.

You will follow an individually negotiated programme of skills development, creating your own pathway through the degree and empowering you to take full advantage of opportunities for personal development, research, ensemble activities, work placements, and live production roles along the way.



We welcome applications from individuals whose academic qualifications do not match (in terms of equivalence) or fall short of the normal entrance requirements*. We will consider all relevant experience that may compensate for the lack of traditional education.

Having satisfied the audition panel that you meet the selection criteria and demonstrated that you have the capacity and capability to pursue the proposed programme of study, such applicants will be considered through examination of contextualised data provided in accordance with the Non-Standard Entry Policy.

*Note that UK Visa and Immigration (UKVI) imposes minimum English Language qualifications in respect of international applicants who require a Student Visa to study in the UK.

Language requirements

The language of study at Royal Conservatoire of Scotland (RCS) is English. If your first language is not English, you will be required to provide evidence of proficiency in English.
